In reality, *every* program we offer addresses the mental health of those we serve. Parents cannot be there for their children, students cannot succeed in school, and older adults cannot continue to live independently if they don't have the emotional resources necessary to cope with life's challenges.

At the beginning of the month on May 9, we gathered with 150+ guests at our annual gala. While this event was fun and celebratory, everyone there learned about the impact we're having on mental health and quality of life more broadly. We are so grateful to everyone who joined us and gave so generously so that we may continue this important work!

WHO WAS YOUR MENTOR?

Did you have someone growing up – a teacher, a coach, a neighbor – who had a positive impact on your life? Do you know that not all children benefit from these "natural mentors"? In fact, the more risk factors a child has in their life (growing up in poverty, trouble in school, language barriers), the less likely they are to naturally connect with an adult role model who can be a positive influence. But, those are the kids that need mentors the most!

Today, there are over 80 children on Family Services' mentoring programs' wait lists. That's 80 kids in need of a...

PARENTING PROGRAMS

Family Services' **Family & Community Resource Center** (FCRC), located at our satellite office at One Union Street in Lawrence, is launching some new parenting programs in the coming months!

To meet the needs of parents, address the struggles they face and build on their strengths, Family Services' FCRC will be offering four parenting groups over the coming year. Two of them (**The Parenting Journey** and **Nurturing Fathers**) have been offered at the FCRC for a while and will continue because of their value and impact. New to the menu of programs will be **Parenting in America** and **Active Parenting**.

"These two new curricula help the parents deal with the struggles of raising kids through each developmental phase," says **Betsy Green, Family Programs Director,** "and adds an important component of parenting across cultures, which will help lots of parents who are new to this community."









As you can see from these photos, there's even more going on at the FCRC. In addition to parenting, the FCRC provides:

- Assessment and family support planning and access to basic needs.
- Peer-to-peer support groups for teens, parents and grandparents raising grandchildren.
- Children's play groups.
- Life skills workshops such as bullying prevention, financial literacy and behavior management.
- Cultural, social, recreational, and community service activities, including holiday gatherings and community celebrations.
- Information, resource and referral services.

Samaritans Awarded Grant

Family Services' was recently awarded a grant from the Massachusetts **Department of Public Health** (DPH) as part of its state-wide effort to reduce the incidence of suicidal ideation, behavior, and deaths in Massachusetts.


"Too many people are struggling with behavioral health issues that can contribute to an increased risk of suicide for some. Suicide is preventable, and DPH has made it a priority to provide funding and reduce barriers to evidence-based interventions so residents can access the help they need when and where they need it," said Public Health Commissioner Robbie Goldstein, MD, PhD.

With this grant funding, Family Services will expand the services provided by its **Samaritans of Merrimack Valley** program. The Samartians will provide additional support groups for survivors of suicide loss and suicide attempt survivors, trainings for individuals who interact with at-risk populations, and initiate new services specifically for LGBTQIA+ folks.

"We are very excited about the new programs we will be implementing to expand our scope of services," said **Debbie Helms, Samaritans Program Director**. "This grant allows us to reach traditionally under-served/historically marginalized groups as well as provide much needed support services to the growing number of people affected by suicide."

This funding builds on Family Services other work in the field of mental health and suicide prevention, including the **988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline.** The Lifeline provides free and confidential emotional support to those experiencing emotional distress and/or thoughts of suicide 24/7, 365 days a year via phone, chat, and text. The Lifeline can be reached by dialing **988** or 978-327-6607.

Do you regularly interact with young people? Do you want to make a difference in the youth mental health crisis? Then these trainings are for YOU!

Family Services is pleased to offer Question, Persuade, Refer (QPR) and Youth Mental Health First Aid (YMHFA) FREE for individuals and groups throughout the region.

QPR is a 2-hour suicide prevention training where participants will learn how to recognize when someone is in crisis and talk with them about getting help.

YMHFA is a 7-hour training for adults who interact with young people that teaches how to help an adolescent

ATTENTION: If you are a teacher, school staff, coach, camp counselor, youth group leader, parent, or any adult who works with or cares about young people, this training is essential! (CEUs available for YMHFA)
